FADE IN:

EXT. AVESENES-LE-SEC AERODROME - CONTINUOUS

November 19, 1917.

At Cambrai, the German Mechanics are working on the German Triplane's engine. The other mechanics are setting up the triplane out of the tent hanger where other parked triplanes are. General Ernst von Hoepfner examines the triplane.

ERNST VON HOEPPNER

(Speaking in German)

*Check the propeller. Make sure it  
doesn't fall off.*

INSERT - SKY

A squadron of British Sopwith Camels are diving towards Avesenes-Le-Sec Aerodrome.

BACK TO SCENE

ERNST VON HOEPPNER (CONT'D)

(Shouting in German)

*They're not one of ours! **Run for  
your lives!***

The Germans are running for their lives to take cover. The British Fighters BOMB AND STRAFE on the German Aerodrome destroying the numerous triplanes. The German Air Mechanics were killed by Major Elliot's twin Vickers Machine Guns. One of the German Air Mechanics opened fire at the intruders with German Anti-Aircraft Machine Guns. One of the German Pilots scrambled to his triplane. The German Triplane is about to takeoff, but the German Pilot was killed causing the triplane HITS the nose on the ground. The British Fighter takes out the German Air Mechanic while MANNING the machine gun along with other two air mechanics. Lothar von Richthofen tried to take off with his triplane, but it was too late. The British Fighter STRAFED on Lothar's Triplane. Lothar CRASHED into the ground. Lothar suffered a serious head injury. The British Fighter DROPS THE BOMB on the hanger. The British Fighters left the German Aerodrome in ruins. Wolfram found Lothar in the wreckage.

WOLFRAM VON RICHTHOFEN

Lothar, are you alright?

LOTHAR VON RICHTHOFEN

(Groans in pain.)

It's Major Elliot and his squadron  
of Sopwith Camels. Where's my  
brother?

WOLFRAM VON RICHTHOFEN

Your brother isn't here, yet.

LOTHAR VON RICHTHOFEN

I need a medic.

WOLFRAM VON RICHTHOFEN

Don't worry. The paramedics will  
take you to the hospital to check  
your injury.

CUT TO:

TITLE EPISODE: KAISERSCHLACHT

FADE OUT.

ACT I

FADE IN:

EXT. WESTERN FRONT - MAP

The map of the Western Front shows the military strength on both sides.

NARRATOR (V.O.)

*Kaiserschlacht* is the German word for German Spring Offensive which began on March 21, 1918.

CLOSE-UP: THE ALLIED AND GERMAN MILITARY UNITS ON BOTH SIDES.

NARRATOR (V.O.) (CONT'D)

The Allied Forces include 26 divisions, 3 calvary units, 3 Mark IV Tanks, and a squadron of British Fighters and Bombers facing off against 72 German Divisions, 3 A7V Tanks, and a squadron of Fokker Triplanes. The Germans also introduce to a new fighter in the war: The Fokker D.VII which entered service in the Spring of 1918. This is the battle between the British Defense and the German Attackers on the Western Front.

DISSOLVE TO:

INT. SOMME TRENCH - DAY

March 21, 1918.

The British Soldiers are setting up barbed wires behind the trench. Colonel Young doesn't like General Adams' plan.

COLONEL YOUNG

Oh, great. Now we can't advance further.

GENERAL ADAMS

We're here to defend our line, Colonel Young, so none of the German Soldiers will advance our line.

COLONEL YOUNG

Such as the Marne River and Ypres?

MAJOR SMYTHE

You mean the Second Battle of Ypres?

COLONEL YOUNG

Right. We brought tanks, artillery, and armored cars.

GENERAL ADAMS

But we do have an air support to stop the German Advance before they reach our lines.

COLONEL YOUNG

We already have air support.

GENERAL ADAMS

There's a new batch of squadron coming, Colonel Young. A British Squadron of Handley-Page O/400 Bombers are on their way to repel the German Attackers.

Colonel Young was shocked!

COLONEL YOUNG

You mean we have bombers of our own?

GENERAL ADAMS

Yes, General Ludendorff sent the German Troops to attack us.

MAJOR SMYTHE

They brought tanks and I can't wait to see a tank-on-tank battle.

COLONEL YOUNG

Me too.

Captain Woolsey and THREE AUSTRALIAN GUNNERS came to see General Adams and his soldiers. One of the Australian Soldier was carrying Vickers Machine Guns and other two Australians carried Lewis Machine Guns.

CAPTAIN WOOLSEY

Guys, I want you to meet Sergeant Cedric Popkin. He's an Australian Gunner to join us.

CEDRIC POPKIN

It's an honor to meet you, mate.

General Adams saluted to the Australian Gunner.

GENERAL ADAMS

It's nice to see you, Sergeant Popkin.

CEDRIC POPKIN

And these are my comrades, Robert Buie and Snowy Evans.

He also saluted to Robert and Snowy.

GENERAL ADAMS

How are you, guys?

ROBERT BUIE

GENERAL HUBERT GOUGH wants to see us for our mission.

COLONEL YOUNG

Where is he?

SNOWY EVANS

Follow me. We'll show you where General Gough is.

CUT TO:

EXT. SOMME TRENCH - DAY

Four British Soldiers follow the Australian Gunners to meet General Gough at the artillery defense position.

SIR HUBERT GOUGH

You must be the British Soldiers  
who survived the bombing raid on  
Passchendaele.

GENERAL ADAMS

Yes, General Gough.

SIR HUBERT GOUGH

I heard a report from the British  
Aerial Attack on the German  
Aerodrome at Cambrai.

COLONEL YOUNG

What the bloody hell are the  
British Pilots thinking?

SIR HUBERT GOUGH

They're not the British Pilots. It  
was the Canadian Squadron. CAPTAIN  
ROY BROWN led his 209 Squadron to  
prevent the Germans to call air  
support.

MAJOR SMYTHE

Isn't that a war crime?

SIR HUBERT GOUGH

It's not a war crime. The  
Canadians Air Attack on Cambrai  
Aerodrome is a right thing to do  
to stop any German Aces from  
shooting down our bombers.

CAPTAIN WOOLSEY

Such as the British Handley Page  
Bombers?

SIR HUBERT GOUGH

Exactly.

(MORE)

SIR HUBERT GOUGH

The Handley Page O/400s are high-altitude bombers to attack German Factories, munitions, railways, and naval shipyards—

COLONEL YOUNG

What about the German U-Boats?

SIR HUBERT GOUGH

Yes, Colonel. The bombers do attack U-Boat bases so the Germans can't sink our ships in the North Atlantic.

They heard three German A7V Tanks RUMBLING towards the Allied Line.

GENERAL ADAMS

What's that sound?

Sir Hubert Gough looks at the distance.

SIR HUBERT GOUGH

Oh no! It's the German Tanks!

FADE OUT.

END OF ACT I



ACT II

FADE IN:

EXT. SOMME TRENCH - CONTINUOUS

The German Soldiers are closing in the Allied Trench. They brought three A7V Tanks with them.

GENERAL ADAMS

The Germans brought tanks to  
breakthrough our line!

SIR HUBERT GOUGH

**Defense positions, soldiers! Get  
your artillery guns ready!**

The Allied Soldiers defend their position with their rifles and artillery pieces. Three Australian Soldiers manned their machine guns to defend their line as the German Ground Forces move closer until they reach the Allied Line.

GENERAL ADAMS

**Ready. Aim. FIRE!**

The Allied Artilleries FIRE at the German Attackers. Some of the German Soldiers were killed by the artillery shells. Three Australian Gunners FIRE at the German Attackers, while the Allied Soldiers FIRE with their rifles. Major Smythe FIRES at the Germans with his sniper. At the last moment, the German A7V Tanks move to their positions and FIRE at the artillery guns with 5.7 cm Maxim-Nodernfelt cannons. All the artillery guns were out of commission.

SIR HUBERT GOUGH

**Retreat! (x2)**

As the Allied Soldiers begin to retreat, the footage shows the side of the A7V firing with 7.9 mm machine guns. Some of the Allied Soldiers were killed by the German Tanks and soldiers. General Gough and his soldiers are in full retreat.

COLONEL YOUNG

Why are we running?

CAPTAIN WOOLSEY

We're no match against A7Vs,  
Young!

COLONEL YOUNG

Where are the bloody  
reinforcements?

CAPTAIN WOOLSEY

Don't worry. Help is on the way.

MAJOR SMYTHE

Guys, what about our men?

Captain Woolsey looked behind the trench and saw the German  
Soldiers carrying flamethrowers.

CAPTAIN WOOLSEY

Oh, bloody hell!

Some of the Germans use flamethrowers to burn the Allied  
Soldiers inside the trench. The men SCREAMED IN PAIN. The  
Germans continue their advance toward the Allied Line.

CUT TO:

INT.: VILLERS-BRETONNEUX - DAY

15 miles towards Amiens, the Allies stopped at Villers-  
Bretonneux Trench. General Gough was waiting for them to regroup  
along.

SIR HUBERT GOUGH

**Inside the trench, soldiers! Hold  
your line!**

The Allies regrouped with General Gough at Villers-Bretonneux  
Trench to protect Paris at all costs.

COLONEL YOUNG

General Gough! We need air  
support!

GENERAL ADAMS

Leave it to me, Colonel. I'll call  
the air support.

General Adams went inside the dugout to call the air support as  
the Allies fortify their positions with their rifles and machine  
guns. Some of the Allied Soldiers were wounded during Operation  
Michael.

COMMANDER SMYTHE

How bad is it?

CAPTAIN WOOLSEY

It's bad, Smythe. The Germans brought tanks to overrun our positions.

COLONEL YOUNG

Where's our air support?

COMMANDER SMYTHE

Here they come!

CUT TO:

INT./EXT. WESTERN FRONT - CONTINUOUS

A squadron of British Sopwith Camel Fighters REPELLED the German Attackers with twin Vickers Machine Guns. Some of the German Soldiers were killed by Captain Roy Brown and his 209 Squadron while others retreat. Meanwhile, a squadron of Handley Page O/400 Bombers DROPPED THEIR PAYLOADS on the German Anti-Aircraft Guns and artillery pieces. The British Fighters regrouped with the British Bombers until Captain Roy Brown spots the Red Baron and his fighter squadron in 10,000 feet above them. The Red Baron's Flying Circus include German Pfalz D.III and Fokker D.VII Biplanes and Fokker Triplanes. The Red Baron leads his squadron to intercept the British Bombers, but Captain Roy Brown and his squadron stayed with the bombers. Fighter Squadron are in a dogfight, while the British Gunners OPEN FIRE at the German Fighters. One of the Handley Page Bombers was HIT on the right engine and the left rudder was damaged by the German Interceptors, but the British Nose Gunner managed to SHOOT DOWN the Fokker D.VII. Stock footage was taken from *Dogfights: The Greatest Air Battles* as the Fokker D.VII spins out of control and the other four have separated from each other. Then, the British Squadron of SE5s joined the fight against the Red Baron and his Flying Circus. The SE5s attack the German Interceptors, but one of the SE5s spins down in flames. The British Pilot spots the Fokker D.VII right in front of him. The SE5a gets behind the Fokker D.VII and fires with his Vickers Machine Gun. The stricken Fokker D.VII crashed into a tree. One of the Sopwith Camel Fighter Pilot was wounded, and the German Pilot ends up in midair collision. The British SE5a Pilot kills the German Pilot with Vickers Machine Gun.

CLOSE-UP ON THE GERMAN PILOT KILLED WHILE FLYING ON THE GERMAN PFALZ D.III.

BRITISH SOPWITH CAMEL PILOT, CAPTAIN "SNOOPY" WILCO, opens fire with his twin Vickers Machine Guns at the Fokker D.VII. Tracer rounds KNOCKED the flight instrument panels off and the fuel tank was BLOWN UP by armored piercing bullets. The Fokker D.VII's cockpit is on fire and the German Pilot pulls the trigger with his pistol to KILL himself, offscreen.

SFX: GUNSHOT

Moments later, the SE5 Pilot was mortally wounded by the German Pilot with his twin Spandau Machine Guns. The SE5 Pilot salutes the German Pilot, but he didn't see another SE5a shooting right behind him until it's too late. The wounded German Pilot SCREAMS as the German Pfalz D.III spins out of control. Meanwhile, the British Pilot was flying the Sopwith Camel who was drinking a bottle of wine. The dogfight rages on "No-Man's Land" as Captain Wilco spots the Red Baron chasing the Handley Page Bomber on its tail. He dives to rescue the British Bomber as the Red Baron damages the nose section of the British Bomber with his twin Spandau Machine Guns. Captain Wilco distracts the Red Baron with his twin Vickers Machine Guns. The Red Baron is chasing down Commander "Snoopy." He tried to shake off the Red Baron, but his Sopwith Camel's rotary engine was damaged. His plane SPUTTERED and was forced to crash land on the enemy lines.

GO TO:

EXT. NO MAN'S LAND - DAY

Captain Wilco gets out of the cockpit as the German Soldiers spot the wreckage, but Wilco pulled out HIS REVOLVER and SHOOTS inside the cockpit to set his plane on fire. Major Elliot spots the Sopwith Camel landed on the enemy lines.

MAJOR ELLIOT

(Calling out)

You need to ride?

"Snoopy" nods his head and climbs on ELLIOT'S Sopwith Camel's right wing.

CAPTAIN "SNOOPY" WILCO

German Soldiers! Get us out of here, Elliot!

Major Elliot takes off as the German Soldiers fire at the British Plane.

GO TO:

INT./EXT. WESTERN FRONT - CONTINUOUS

C holds the Sopwith Camel's strut, so he won't fall off. Suddenly, flak burst all around the British Fighter, until Major Elliot's plane was hit by a flak. The leaking oil sprayed all over Elliot's face!

MAJOR ELLIOT

Aah! I can't see the bloody thing!

The stricken fighter stalls out and spirals out of control.

FADE OUT.

END OF ACT II

ACT III

FADE IN:

INT./EXT. WESTERN FRONT - CONTINUOUS

The stricken fighter continues spiraling out of control. Wilco instructs Elliot to control his plane.

CAPTAIN "SNOOPY" WILCO

Pull up, Elliot! Pull up!

MAJOR ELLIOT

But I can't see the bloody thing!

CAPTAIN "SNOOPY" WILCO

Do it!

CLOSE UP ON MAJOR ELLIOT CONTROLLING HIS SOPWITH CAMEL.

Elliot raises the nose up to recover from stalling speed.

CAPTAIN "SNOOPY" WILCO (CONT'D)

Steady.

BACK TO:

INT. VILLERS-BRETONNEUX - CONTINUOUS

Major Smythe witnesses the stricken fighter coming towards them.

MAJOR SMYTHE

What's that?

CAPTAIN WOOLSEY

It's a Sopwith Camel and Major Elliot is out of control!

MAJOR ELLIOT

Is that our line?

CAPTAIN "SNOOPY" WILCO

Yes, it's going to be rough landing here.

The stricken plane is getting nearer and nearer until Elliot made a rough landing. Major Smythe is about to get runover by the stricken fighter.

MAJOR SMYTHE

The plane is headed right for us!

CAPTAIN WOOLSEY

**Scatter!**

The Allied Soldiers split up just in time before the stricken plane turns upside-down. Captain Wilco fell into the trench unscathed.

CAPTAIN "SNOOPY" WILCO

Elliot, are you alright?

MAJOR ELLIOT

I'm upside-down, Wilco. Can you pull me out of the wreckage?

CAPTAIN "SNOOPY" WILCO

Alright, Elliot. Hold still. I'll get you out of here in no time.

Wilco helps Elliot to get out of the cockpit.

MAJOR ELLIOT

Thank you, Wilco.

CAPTAIN WOOLSEY

Are you two alright?

MAJOR ELLIOT

There's oil on my face.

CAPTAIN WOOLSEY

Don't worry. I have a first aid kit to wipe your oily face.

Captain Woolsey opens his first aid kit and finds the eye ointment to wipe Elliot's oily face. He washes Elliot's face first with a wet towel to get rid of oil stains off Elliot's face. He was worried that he'll never fly his plane against the Red Baron and his squadron.

CAPTAIN "SNOOPY" WILCO

Is it going to work?

CAPTAIN WOOLSEY

Yes, Jordan. Hold still.

Captain Woolsey uses eye ointment for Elliot's eyes treatment.  
He puts the bandages to cover Elliot's eyes.

CAPTAIN WOOLSEY (CONT'D)

Are you feeling alright?

MAJOR ELLIOT

Yeah, but I can still fly-.

CAPTAIN "SNOOPY" WILCO

No, you can't. Your eyes need to  
heal first.

GENERAL ADAMS

What's going on here?

CAPTAIN "SNOOPY" WILCO

There's an oil leak all over  
Elliot's face.

GENERAL ADAMS

Can you stand up, Elliot?

MAJOR ELLIOT

I can't see that well.

GENERAL ADAMS

Take Elliot to a safe place,  
Snoopy. Sargent Popkin, take your  
men to Vaux sur Somme to distract  
the Red Baron.

CEDRIC POPKIN

Yes, Sir! Right away, Sir!

Sergeant Popkin and two Australian Gunners left the trench,  
while the Allied Soldiers defend their line until Allied  
Reinforcements arrive to repel the German Attackers before they  
reach Paris.

CUT TO:



EXT.: VAUX SUR SOMME - DAY

April 21, 1918.

Three Australians Gunners have a plan to take down the Red Baron.

CEDRIC POPKIN

We need to split up. Robert, take Snowy to the hillside.

ROBERT BUIE

Are you sure?

SNOWY EVANS

We can work together to bring the Red Baron down.

CEDRIC POPKIN

I'll stay here in case the red triplane shows up.

ROBERT BUIE AND SNOWY EVANS

Yes Sir!

They left Sergeant Popkin behind.

CUT TO:

INT./EXT. LYS - CONTINUOUS

After the British Bombers left the battle, the British Fighters are still fighting against the Red Baron and his squadron. Most of the British Fighters were shot down, but the Germans lost one Fokker Triplane, two Pfalz D.III Fighters, and four Fokker D.VII Fighters. The Red Baron pursue the CANADIAN PILOT, WILFRID MAY, in a treetop level. He's running out of airspace until Captain Roy Brown came to Wilfrid's rescue. Wilfrid May tried to outmaneuver the Red Baron, but he's still on Wilfrid's tail. Sergeant Popkin waits for a signal. The Australians loaded their machine guns until they spot a red triplane chasing Wilfrid May.

CEDRIC POPKIN

Steady, mates, and wait until you see the red plane.

Two Australians nod their heads as three airplanes are getting closer and closer, until the right moment. Wilfred went past the Australians, until they spot a red triplane.

CEDRIC POPKIN (CONT'D)

Now it's your chance, mates! **Shoot  
it down!**

Two Australians Soldiers opened fire at the red triplane with their Lewis Machine Guns. The Red Baron dodged the bullets until Sergeant Popkin fires with his Vickers Machine Gun. Finally, the Red Baron is distracted and turns away. Now, it's Captain Roy Brown's chance to shoot down the Red Baron. The Red Baron was fatally wounded by Captain Brown's twin Vickers Machine Guns. The Red Baron crash landed on the Allied Lines. The red triplane's wings and the landing gear were wrecked.

ROBERT BUIE

The Red Baron is down, Sarge!

CEDRIC POPKIN

Alright mates. Let's get him!

The Australians found the Red Baron dying.

SNOWY EVANS

Manfred, why did you shoot down  
Wilco?

MANFRED VON RICHTHOFEN

(coughing)

Because he's the British Pilot  
trying to save the Handley Page  
Bomber.

ROBERT BUIE

How do you know? Our Bombers are  
the key to ending the war on the  
Western Front.

MANFRED VON RICHTHOFEN

(dying)

The war...isn't over yet...

(coughing)

(MORE)

MANFRED VON RICHTHOFEN (CONT'D)

...and we failed to shoot down the  
British Handley-Page Bombers...

(coughing)

But we did shoot down the French  
Bombers last year.

CEDRIC POPKIN

Not until the Americans finish off  
with the Germans!

MANFRED VON RICHTHOFEN

(dying)

You're already too late! My  
squadron...

(coughing)

...shot down Rogers and Knight to  
avenge the destruction of the  
German Zeppelin over London.  
They're already...dead.

SNOWY EVANS

What do you mean?

MANFRED VON RICHTHOFEN

(Dying in German)

*Kaputt.*

With his last words, the Red Baron dies at age 25. The  
Australians knew they must regroup with General Adams before the  
German Onslaught continues to advance towards Paris and worst of  
all, the Germans brought their tanks for their advantage over  
the Allies.

ROBERT BUIE

I had enough of this! Let's tear  
the bloody triplane apart!

SNOWY EVANS

Yeah, the Red Baron's justice will  
be served!

CEDRIC POPKIN

No, leave the bloody wreckage  
behind.

ROBERT BUIE AND SNOWY EVANS

What?!

CEDRIC POPKINS

The Germans brought A7Vs to take  
Paris. We need get back to our  
bloody line before we get caught  
by the Germans.

SNOWY EVANS

But, Sir, we can't just stay here-

CEDRIC POPKIN

Load your machine guns and get  
going.

ROBERT BUIE AND SNOWY EVANS

Yes, Sir!

The Australians left the crash site, unaware of the German  
Pilots will suffer more casualties in the aerial combat against  
the Allied Pilots on the Western Front.

FADE OUT:

END OF ACT III

ACT IV

FADE IN:

INT. VILLERS-BRETONNEUX - DAY

April 24, 1918.

Three Australians arrived at Villers-Bretonneux where other soldiers are defending their position, waiting for the tanks arrive in battle against the German Attackers.

GENERAL ADAMS

Where have you been? Our 8<sup>th</sup> Infantry Division suffered heavy casualties earlier and now the Germans brought tanks to destroy our position!

CEDRIC POPKIN

But General, we took out the Red Baron.

SNOWY EVANS

And Roy Brown shot that bastard down.

ROBERT BUIE

What he means is the German Ace was flying the red triplane.

GENERAL ADAMS

Good work, you three.

COLONEL YOUNG

But we have bigger problems. The Germans are headed right for us.

Three A7Vs are headed towards the Allied Lines. So, Cedric Popkin went into the dugout to call reinforcements.

GO TO:

INT. VILLERS-BRETONNEUX - DUGOUT

Cedric Popkin was talking on the telephone as the German Tanks and Soldiers are getting closer to the Allied Lines.

CEDRIC POPKIN

Hello? This is Cedric Popkin. I need tanks to repel the German Attackers.

CUT TO:

INT./EXT. VILLERS-BRETONNEUX - CONTINUOUS

Three British Mark IV Tanks arrived at Villers-Bretonneux to deal with the German A7Vs. One of the British Mark IVs is a Male Tank and the other two are Female Tanks which it was taken from *Greatest Tank Battles* footage to prepare for their first tank battle between the Germans and the British Tanks. Inside the Mark IV Male Tank is 2<sup>ND</sup> LIEUTENANT FRANK MITCHELL, who leads the 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion Tank Corps to defend the Allied Line from the German Attackers.

FRANK MITCHELL

How many tanks do we have?

MARK IV TANK CREW #1

I counted two Female Mark IVs and seven Medium Mark A Whippets.

FRANK MITCHELL

I don't like those odds, but we must defend our frontline at all costs.

*The Greatest Tank Battles* footage was taken as ONE OF MARK IV TANK CREW opened the hatch and spots three A7Vs straight ahead.

MARK IV TANK CREW #1

Lieutenant Mitchell, we've got three Jerry Tanks incoming!

FRANK MITCHELL

Aim for the lead tank.

The Male Mark IV fires with its main armament at the A7Vs, but two Female Mark IVs were taken damage by one of the A7Vs. The lead German Tank fires with its main gun at the British Tank. Suddenly, the A7V opens fire at Mitchell's Tank with two 7.9 mm machine guns on the right side of A7V, killing the Lewis Gunner, offscreen.

MARK IV TANK CREW #1

Frank, we've lost our gunner!

FRANK MITCHELL

Bloody Hell!

The A7V continues firing at the lone Mark IV.

FRANK MITCHELL (CONT'D)

Our tank can't take a hit much longer! Do something!

MARK IV TANK CREW #1

We have two QF 6-pounder 6 cwt Hotchkiss Guns to take out the A7V.

FRANK MITCHELL

Then use the main battery.

MARK IV TANK CREW #1

Yes, Sir!

The Mark IV shoots the A7V three times with its main armament until the German Tank was knocked out. THE SURVIVING A7V TANK CREW bailed out, including 2. LEUTNANT WILHELM BILTZ, leaving five A7V Tank Crew dead inside the abandoned tank.

WILHELM BILTZ

*Aus. (x2)*

The other two A7Vs retreated away from the wreckage.

(Speaking in German)

*Use explosives on Nixe.*

A7V TANK CREW #1

(Speaking in German)

*But Sir, we shouldn't--!*

WILHELM BILTZ

*Tu es!*

The A7V Tank Crew did follow Wilhelm's orders, by using explosives to blow up Nixe in pieces. Frank Mitchell witnessed the carnage.

FRANK MITCHELL

What the bloody hell was that?

MARK IV TANK CREW #1

The Germans destroyed one of their own tanks!

FRANK MITCHELL

What? Those bastards can't do that!

MARK IV TANK CREW #1

What about the other two A7Vs?

FRANK MITCHELL

(sighs)

Let them go.

MARK IV TANK CREW #1

Let them go?

FRANK MITCHELL

They're too many Germans attacking our frontline. Regroup with General Adams and his forces.

Frank Mitchell decided not to follow two A7Vs and regroup with General Adams and his Infantry Division.

CUT TO:

INT/EXT. MARNE RIVER - DAY

July 15, 1918.

The Allies are at Marne River once again, but this time, the Allies build the bridge this time, so the Allied Infantry Platoon can cross the bridge and stop the Germans advance towards Paris, just like they did last time.



COLONEL YOUNG

General Adams, why are we building the bridge?

GENERAL ADAMS

Because last time, we blow up the bridge to prevent the Germans crossing the Marne River.

MAJOR SMYTHE

What about the tanks?

GENERAL ADAMS

It's too dangerous for the tanks to cross the bridge.

MAJOR SMYTHE

Oh?

COLONEL YOUNG

We're soldiers. It's safe enough for us to cross the bridge on foot.

CEDRIC POPKIN

General Adams, the bridge is finished.

GENERAL ADAMS

Good work. Let's cross the bridge before the Germans attack us again.

The Allied Soldiers crossed the bridge to get to the other side.

COLONEL YOUNG

We made it!

GENERAL ADAMS

Now we don't have to worry about fighting on the bridge.

CEDRIC POPKIN

General Adams, we got company!

The German Troops are advancing towards the Marne River once again, but this time, the Germans brought a tank with them. What the Allies didn't know the Germans captured Mark IV Tank to fool the Allied Soldiers.

COLONEL YOUNG

Is that one of ours?

GENERAL ADAMS

No, it's not one of ours! **Get  
down!**

The German Mark IV Tank attacked the Allied Forces with machine gun fire until the French Reinforcements arrived. The French brought Saint-Chamond Tanks with them. The French and the Germans fight each other to protect Paris at all costs. The German Mark IV was destroyed by the French Tank. The Germans are starting to retreat.

The German Spring Offensive is over. 139,000 German Soldiers were either killed or wounded and 29,367 were taken prisoners. The Allies lost 16,552 British Soldiers and 95,165 French Soldiers were either dead or wounded. BRITISH GENERAL, SIR ALEXANDER JOHN GODLEY came to see General Adams.

SIR ALEXANDER JOHN GODLEY

Well, done, General Adams! You've saved Paris once again.

GENERAL ADAMS

Thank you, General Godley. I couldn't have done it without the French Support.

SIR ALEXANDER JOHN GODLEY

General Foch told me after the Battle of Soissons, I called the reinforcements to aid you and your soldiers to cut off the Germans.

GENERAL ADAMS

What about the Red Baron?

SIR ALEXANDER JOHN GODLEY

The Red Baron was shot down in our  
line, by Captain Roy Brown.

COLONEL YOUNG

Alright! Now the Red Baron is  
gone, let's celebrate our victory!

FADE IN:

INT. VILLERS-BRETONNEUX - DAY

July 18, 1918.

General Adams and Colonel Young came to see Major Elliot with Captain Woolsey.

COLONEL YOUNG

Elliot! Wilco!

MAJOR ELLIOT

Colonel Young, how are you doing?

COLONEL YOUNG

I heard the news about the Red Baron's death. What about you, Wilco?

MAJOR ELLIOT

Wilco and I are heading back to my squadron with Captain Roy Brown.

COLONEL YOUNG

Aren't you going to join us?

MAJOR ELLIOT

I appreciate your offer, but I'm going back to the aerodrome to regroup with Roy Brown and his squadron. We'll meet again after the war is over.

Colonel Young watches Major Elliot as he went inside the back of the truck and drives away from Villers-Bretonneux to celebrate victory and death of the Red Baron at the British Aerodrome, while Colonel Young stayed behind with General Adams and the British Soldiers.

CUT TO:

EXT. BRITISH AERODROME - DAY

As we HEAR the victory music on the background, Major Elliot and Captain "Snoopy" Wilco returned to the British Aerodrome and hugs Captain Roy Brown. He takes him inside the tent hanger.

GO TO:

EXT. WESTERN FRONT - CONTINUOUS

The American Soldiers arrived on the Western Front to prepare for Hundred Days Offensive. Meanwhile, the wounded German Pilot escapes from the wreckage of Fokker D.VII.

GO TO:

EXT. SOUTH CEMETERY WIESBADEN - CONTINUOUS

Captain Roy Brown dropped the Wreath at The Red Baron's Grave and saluted to the German Soldiers.

GO TO:

INT. CAFE - DAY

Colonel Young rejoined with General Adams and his soldiers to celebrate their victory in Paris, France.
